Managing innovation for sustainable health – Developing capacity in the public sector for successful multisectoral and innovative work to strengthen the 2030 Agenda and sustainable health in fragile settings

Based on the 2030 Agenda, the aim of the programme is for participants to develop their capacity to successfully collaborate across sectors and use an innovative approach to strengthening both preventive and curative health care in partnering countries.

The programme is organised by Karolinska Institutet in collaboration with Makerere University School of Public Health, Benadir University, University of Kinshasa School of Public Health, and the innovation company Tinkr. Partnering countries are DRC, Somalia, and Uganda.

MIDWIZE Capacity building program for public health officials in maternal and child health

This programme offers an innovative approach to strengthening professional competence and confidence among leaders in the maternal and child health field in East African countries. The programme addresses how to achieve sustainable health, encourages interdisciplinary multi-professional teamwork, and utilizes evidence-based practices by choosing the right strategy.

The programme is organised by Karolinska Institutet in collaboration with Makerere University. Partnering countries are Ethiopia, Kenya, Malawi, and Uganda.

Lund University

Co-design for Sustainable, Resilient and Inclusive Public Spaces and Services

The programme aims to create improved services through co-design for more inclusive, resilient, and sustainable cities, focusing on both physical and digital public spaces and services. The goal is to increase the municipalities' capacity to co-design inclusive public spaces and services for sustainable and resilient cities, with particular focus on vulnerable groups.

The programme is organised by Lund University in collaboration with the Raoul Wallenberg Institute and SKL International. Partnering countries are Indonesia, North Macedonia, and Turkey.

Human Rights and Gender Equality in Climate and Disaster Displacement

The programme aims to make African cities more inclusive of climate migrants and more resilient to displacement risk. The programme's objective is to strengthen the capacity of key actors to integrate human rights and gender equality principles to address displacement risk in the context of disasters and climate change.

The programme is organised by Lund University in collaboration with The Raoul Wallenberg Institute. Partnering countries are Sierra Leone, Ethiopia, Kenya, and Uganda.

Innovation in Governance for Urban Nature-based Solutions

This programme focuses on governance and leadership innovation in the area of Nature-based Solutions (NBS) for improved urban environments. In this programme, participants explore how their administration and personnel can transform and innovate by looking at NBS innovation to meet future challenges.

The programme is organised by Lund University. Partnering countries are Armenia, Azerbaijan, Georgia, Moldova, and Ukraine.

Strengthening multisectoral organizational capacity of sexual and gender-based violence in Uganda, Ethiopia, and South Sudan through collaborative public sector innovation (SMOC)

This programme aims to increase capacity for preventing and addressing sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV) through a design-led and rights-based process. The training provides participants with the knowledge, skills, and tools to develop and evaluate a process for policy design, and the national and transnational networks to enable them to work towards a long-term sustainable change.

The programme is organised by Lund University and the Global Academy of SRHR alongside partners in each of the participating countries. Partnering countries are Uganda, Kenya, Ethiopia, and South Sudan.

Stockholm University

Catalysing Change: transformation through public sector innovation

This programme seeks to strengthen the capacities of public and civil sector workers in the Southern African Development Community (SADC). The focus is on understanding and engaging in complex social-ecological systems, in order to innovate and better address complex, inter-linked problems.

The programme is organised by Stockholm University in collaboration with the Stockholm Resilience Centre. Partnering countries are within the SADC countries: Angola, Botswana, Comoros, Democratic Republic of Congo, Eswatini, Lesotho, Madagascar, Malawi, Mauritius, Mozambique, Namibia, Seychelles, South Africa, Tanzania, Zambia, and Zimbabwe.
